The price to the consumer of tobacco goods has shown a bigger increase in the last three years than any equal period since the industry was placed on a solid foundation in this country. To meet the increased demand a number of concerns are making plans for increased capacity and this will mean an increase of labor, which is very scarce.

Irvin S. Cobb, Renowned Writer, Will Tell of the Humor of the Trenches

World's Most Famous War Correspondent, Who Has Been At the Front With the Boys, Has Seen and Heard Some Amusing Things Which He Will Relate—Seats Selling Fast

Interest in the lecture to be delivered Monday night in Memorial Hall of Salem College by Mr. Irvin S. Cobb, the world's greatest war correspondent and America's foremost humorist is increasing.
