### CAROLINIAN FLYING BIG

Lieut. Maynard Now Well on Way Toward Pacific in Ocean to Ocean Flight

### MAKING TERRIFIC SPEED

Fliers String Out all the Way From Mincola to Mississippi River and From San Francisco to Salt Lake City—Three Killed First Day

Mincola, N. Y., Oct. 9.—Rain held up virtually all westbound flyers in the army's trans-continental contest early today at the control stations in Rochester, Buffalo, Bryan and Cleveland. Weather conditions around Chicago had sufficiently improved at noon to allow the westbound flyers to resume.

Eastbound flyers encountered better weather and three pilots were enabled to leave Salt Lake City, Utah, early today for Green River, Wyo., 137 miles distant, and 195 miles from the starting point at San Francisco.

Lieut. Maynard took the air from Ashburn Field here at 7:09 1/2 o'clock this morning. He headed for Rock Island, Ills., 155 miles from here.

Maynard still ahead. Rock Island, Ills., Oct. 9.—Lieut. B. W. Maynard, driving a De Havilland four, arrived at Franing Field here at 8:37 this morning having made the 155 miles from Chicago in 92 minutes. He was the first cross country flyer to reach this point.

### SETS OUT FOR DES MOINES

Rock Island, Ills., Oct. 9.—After taking on supplies the machine driven by Lieut. Maynard again took the air at 9:09 1/2 o'clock for the next control station, which is Des Moines, Ia., 155 miles from here.

### REACHED OMAHA AT 12:48

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 9.—Lieut. B. W. Maynard, leading the field in the trans-continental air derby, arrived at AK-Sar-Bien flying field here at 12:48 today. He made the trip from Des Moines in a distance of 115 miles, in one hour and 14 minutes.
