DOMESTIC.

Frost—The Springs.—We understand that pretty heavy frosts have fallen 12 or 15 days ago, across the mountains, as far as Lewisburg, in the county of Greenbrier. Most of the visitors at the White Sulphur, Hot & Warm Springs, had been induced by this circumstance to quit them, and journey to the lowlands. The number of visitors during this season has been uncommonly great; perhaps at least 600 at one time, at the various Mineral Springs of Western Virginia. Early in this month, there were at least 160 at the White Sulphur; every cabin and room filled; and the guests were overflowing into the neighborhood.

The salubrity of the air; efficacy of the waters; voluptuousness of the various baths; beauties and sublimity of mountain scenery; and the various curiosities which are there spread out by the bountiful hand of nature; fine venison and mutton; and a new system of farming in the pastoral region of the state, are calculated, one should suppose, to attract the man of taste as well as the valetudinarian. The roads are improving considerably; private turnpikes, sanctioned by acts of the Legislature, are made over the most difficult mountains, as for instance across the Eight Mile Mountain, the Sweet Spring Mountain, the Alleghany (between the Sweet Springs and White Sulphur); the different points are thus seemingly drawn nearer together; and the accommodations on the road are very respectable. Port Praya, St. Jago, Aug. 6. In July, while the brig Ruby, Shute, of Bucksport, from Boston, was lying too under short sail, in the harbor of St. Michaels, under the guns of the fort, His Britannic Majesty's ship Redwing, D. C. Clavering, commander, wantonly fired three shot at her, then lowered a boat and sent a Lieutenant and crew on board to search her.
