FOREIGN.

Office of the Nat. Advocate. ? EW YORK, October 9. LATEST FROM LIVERPOOL

By the ship George Cunton from Liverpool, the Editors of the Nat. Advocate has received English papers containing London dates of the evening of the 25th August, also a Liverpool Circular of the 27th, which will be found below.

> From our Correspondent. Liverpool, Aug. 27.

Cotton .- In the early part of the week the market was dull, and prices rather on the decline, but since Wednesday there has been more inquiry both from the trade and for export; and although prices generally are 4d to 4d per lb. lower, yet the market closed with a greater degree of firmness; 1000 bags of American, 1000 Brazil, and 500 Egyptian, have been taken on speculation and 2000 American for export.-The import is, 6612 bags, and the sales amount to 11,706 bags, Upland do ord. to mid. 71 a 81; fair to good, 91 a 10 7 8.

Tobacco. The sales of the week, consist principally of Virginia Leaf and a few stemmed, to the trade, amounting altogether to about 500 hhds. The sales of the month are 435 bhds. Virginia Licaf and 151 Stemmed, 50 Kentucky Leaf and 84 Stemmed; and 106 Virginia Leaf to London; total 875 hads. The imports 737 hads, and the deliveries 458 hnds. The demand has been rather dull during the latter part of the month, the purchasers waiting the arrival of the new crop. The prices are however, very steady, and are 4d 4d per 1b. higher than at the close

LONDON. Aug. 25. The Spaniards of Catalonia have taken up arms in expectation of a new French army crossing the Pyrenees -The Etoile states that a new French army is about to enter Spain-2000 to occupy the Basque provinces, 4000 to be stationed in Arragon, and 2000 in Madrid.

Mr. Owen, since his return to Britain has published one of his American Lectures in the Glasgow Chronicle. -He denies that the people of the United States enjoy real liberty; and reverence for Christianity he calls the despotism of weak minds,' This sort of cant is much older than Mr. Owen.

We have before noticed the continual exportation of the precious metals from the country. We hear that there has been exported to the continent, from the port of Dover alone, very near £800,000 in gold and silver, within the last three months! Within the same brief space, there has been exported hence the enormous sum of £2,830,000. If this continue, and there is every probability of it, the sight of a sovereign will soon be as great a curiosity as a guinea was in 1812. As the gold disappears, ou! will come the paper money, and up will go the prices of agricultural produce, to the ruin of the manufacturers.

Hamburg papers received on Friday, to the 12th, and Dutch to the 10th inst. bring a variety of miscellaneous intelligence. Under date of Hanover, Aug. 10, we find an account of a remarkable earthquake which occurred in that city. On the 29th July, at three in the afternoon, the earth sunk in and left a large lopening in the district of Barlis, in
