The Board of Managers of the Young Men's Colonization Society of Pennsylvania, engaged in a great work of benevolence, look with anxious solicitude to

Painfully sensible of the indifference

prevailing in relation to the cause of Colonization, the Board have been led to enquire what can be done for drawing public attention to this subject, and arousing

It is evident that but little, comparatively

can be accomplished for the effectual

benefit of so large a class of people, until

an intelligent sympathy shall prevail for them throughout the whole country. To

produce such a state of feeling, the diffusion

of information is necessary—the condition

and character of the negro must be

made known—facts and arguments illus-

trating and enforcing his claims must be

spread out before the nation, and urged

with frequent and unweary importunity.
