COLONIZATION HERALD.

The Board of Managers of the Young
Men's Colonization Society of Pennsyl-
vania, engaged in a great work of bene-
volence, look with anxious solicitude to
their fellow citizens for aid and co-ope-
ration.
Painfully sensible of the indifference
which so generally exists toward the ig-
norance and misapprehension so widely
prevalent in relation to the cause of Co-
lonization, the Board have been led to en-
quire what can be done for drawing pub-
lic attention to this subject, and arousing
and combining public sentiment in behal-
of that much injured portion of our popu-
lation.
It is evident that but little, comparative-
ly, can be accomplished for the effectual
benefit of so large a class of people, until
an intelligent sympathy shall prevail for
them throughout the whole country. To
produce such a state of feeling, the diffu-
sion of information is necessary—the con-
dition and character of the negro must be
made known—facts and arguments illus-
trating and enforcing his claims must be
spread out before the nation, and urged
with frequent and unwearied importunity.
In the prosecution of this interesting
purpose, the Board have resolved to com-
mence the publication of a semi-monthly
periodical, under the supervision of the
Executive Committee, to be called the
"COLONIZATION HERALD,"
and to be at once the organ of official
communication, the depository of Colon-
ization intelligence, and the general advo-
cate of the African race.
In proposing the publication of such a
work, it may be proper to state briefly,
the leading principles of the society from
which it emanates:—this cannot be done
better, than by the insertion of the second
and third articles of the Constitution of
the Young Men's Colonization Society,
which are as follows:—
Art. 2. The objects to which its labors
shall be devoted, are—
1st. To provide for civilizing and
christianizing Africa, through the direc-
instrumentality of colored emigrants from
the United States.
2d. To promote, by all legal and con-
stitutional means the intellectual and mo-
ral improvement of the African race.
Art. 3. The principle upon which this
Society bases its operations, are peace
and temperance, in aid of religion—dis-
