Charleston, November 13, 1835 THE undersigned His Britannic Majesty's and has on hand a good assortment of Consul for the States of North & South Carolina, begs to notify to the Masters and Consignees of British vessels and all others whom it may concern, being at or frequenting the ports within the limits of his Consulate, that by virtue of an Act passed during the late session of Parliament, entitled "An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws relating to the Merchant Seamen of the United Kingdom," every Master of a British ship, on his arrival at any foreign port where there is a British Consul or Vice Consul, is required to deposit with such Consul or Vice Consul, the agreement with his ship's crew, under a penalty of wenty- five pounds. By the same Act it is also enacted, that no Master shall discharge any of his crew, whether British subject or foreigner, at any port or place abroad, without the previous sanction in writing of the Consul or Vice Consul there, whose duty it is made in a summary way, to enquire into the grounds of any such proposed discharge, by examination on oath, and there upon to grant or refuse such sanction according to his discretion. Nor is any Master to be at liberty to leave behind at any place abroad any person of his crew, under any pretence whatsoever, unless upon a previous certificate in writing, from the Consul or Vice Consul there, who is enjoined likewise to enquire by examination on oath, into the circumstances, and to give or refuse such certificate according to the result of such examination. And every Master offending against either of these enactments, is to be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and to suffer such punishment by fine or imprisonment, or both, as the Court be-

fore which he shall be convicted shall deem meet And finally, by the said Act it is further enacred, that during the stay of a British ship at any foreign port, no seamen shall be shipped by the Master, except with the privity of the Consul or Vice Consul there, to be endorsed or certified on the agreement, under a penalty of twenty-five pounds, to be forfeited by the Master for every seaman who shall be so shipped in breach of the





GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE. To the General Assembly of North

Carolina: The duty of addressing the representatives of the people, convened to consult for the common good of their constituents, has on no previous occasion been to me the source of so great anxiety and perplexity as the present. This embarrassment arises no less from the peculiar situation of our affairs, than from the mea- . sures in progress to amend the Constitution of the State.

It will be some days before it can be ascertained whether the new Constitution has been adopted or rejected. If it has been adopted, a material change in the basis of representation constitutes one of its most prominent provisions. This expression of the public will, made in the most imposing form known to our institutions, will probably have a decided influence upon your proceedings. You will not, without hesitation, venture upon any radical change in the system of policy hitherto pursued, if it shall be ascertained that the people have transferred the legislative power of the State to a Department which will be constituted upon principles differ-ing essentially from those which enter into the formation of your body. Whatever may be the conclusion at which you ry expression of opinion upon the most important topics which engage public attention.

To much the larger portion of this State, the past year has been a season of more than ordinary prosperity. The production of articles necessary to the sustenance of human life, has been abundant -and our great agricultural staple bas commanded a higher price than has been known for many years. Our citizens. always distinguished for prudence and e conomy in the management of their domestic affairs, aided by the fortunate circulties, than at any previous period of our history. Notwithstanding these clear evidences of the comparatively prosperous condition of the community, the tide of emigration continues to flow in a copious and steady current to the new States and Territories of the West, and we are thus constantly losing many of our most wealthy, enterprizing and intelligent citizens. It is not surprising that the universal and laudable disposition strikingly characteristic of the American people to acquire a permanent interest in the soil, should prompt removals from an old and densey populated country, to sparsely settled regions where good lands may be acquire red at low prices. That we have done less than we might and ought to have done for the accomplishment of these great purposes, is, in my estimation, certain; but that our exertions have been constantly retarded by the system of Federal legislation adopted with regard to us, is not less manifest

This entire subject was so fully discussed in my last annual message, that I shall content myself with a mere reference to that paper, rather than an extended consideration of it in this. It was then attempted to be shewn, that great injustice
