A FROZEN ENGINE.—As the local train on the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta road, Captain John Allison, conductor, was coming towards Charlotte Saturday night the speed of the train gradually slackened until all at once it came to a dead stand-still. Capt. Allison went forward to see what the trouble was, and found that the engine was actually frozen. The air pump was frozen hard and upon parts of the fire box long icicles were hanging. All efforts to get up steam were unavailing and as a last resort a quantity of wood was taken from the tender and piled under the engine, when it was fired, and in the course of a few minutes it had the desired effect and the train once more got under headway. Around the air pump the ice had formed in a solid cake, the engine wheels, trucks and, stranger still, the fire box, were coated with snow and ice. It was a complete freeze up and the train would never have been able to move but for the fire being built under the engine.—Charlotte Observer.
