LONDON, May 4 .- (UP) .-The Austrian government has discovered a plot between the Austrian and German Nazis to overthrow the Austrian cabinet and enforce the Austrian-German union.

Hierl said he will urge that the cabinet connect military training with a plan to concentrate German youths in labor camps,

The labor leaders feared conscription would prove competitively dangerous and ruinous in the end. However, this opposition was not confined solely to the union ranks, and even Franz Seldte, labor minister in the Reich cabinet, consistently has refused to abandon a voluntary labor pol-
