

House Committee Votes To Authorize Stabilization Fund Aides

DOLLAR PEGGED AT 59.06 PCT. OF VALUE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (UP). Pegging the dollar at 59.06 per cent of its former value estab-lishes the United States on an international gold bullion standard, Secretary of Treasury Morgen-thau said today.

"The best way to describe the system is a 1934 model gold bullion standard. It is one that suits our purpose," Morgenthau said.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (UP) President Roosevelt established a 59.06 cent dollar yesterday for the announced purpose of expanding credit, stabilizing prices and protecting this nation's foreign commerce.

Thereby the treasury gained a profit of nearly \$2,700,000,000 on its gold holdings. From this profit is automatically established a \$2,000,000,000 fund for use in controlling the dollar's value in international exchange and for regulating the real value of the dollar by terms of commodities at home.
