### Premier Is Expected to Dissolve French Communist Party

PARIS, Nov. 26. (UP)—Premier Edouard Daladier today conferred with high military commanders and it was believed he was preparing strong measures to suppress increasing labor and left wing protests against his "reform" decrees.

More than five million workers will cease work for 24 hours Wednesday in protest against decrees which suspend the 40-hour week and the levy of taxes which hit hardest the working class.

With unauthorized sit-down strikes spreading throughout the nation and already involving more than 100,000 workers, Premier Daladier used troops, police and all the powers of his new decrees in an effort to crush labor's revolt and save his government from overthrow.

### SNOW STORM ONE OF HEAVIEST KNOWN

A cold wave today settled over the eastern seaboard in the wake of Thanksgiving's snow and sleet storm that extended across half of the nation. Today it had caused at least 71 deaths.

Temperatures ranged from sub-zero in the Adirondacks and upper New England to lows in the 20's in New York City.

Skies cleared and the wind subsided but traffic still is impeded by ice and snow drifts six feet deep along the roads.
