IS NOT BELIEVED TO BE RANSOM CASE

OXON HILL, Md., Dec. 1. (UP) William E. Brown, father of kidnaped Mary Brown, today sought the aid of G-men in the hunt for his abducted 18-year-old daughter, who was forced into a truck last night on the outskirts of Wash-

Brown appealed personally to national FBI headquarters after expressing belief that the girl was attacked and murdered. Brown is an employe of the

Federal Bureau of Printing and Engraving. Volunteer firemen, CCC men and neighbors formed a posse to search the neighborhood where

the girl was abducted. Officers were provided their first tangible clue by Lucy, the victim's 15-year-old sister, who escaped abduction by fleeing across fields when the men accosted the two girls.

Two men resembling the scription of the abductors were held by Washington, D. C., police last night, pending further iden-tification by the missing girl's sister. They were said to be driving a truck similar to the one in which Mary was whisked away
