

"THE FREE SUFFRAGE ACT."

We publish to day the Act of last Session of the Legislature for the purpose of amending the Constitution of the State, so as to allow all persons qualified to vote for members of the House of Commons to vote also for members of the Senate ; which is called " Free Suffrage," This is that party measure which was adopted by the Democratic candidate for Governor in 1848, when he was defeated; but which he revived and electioneered upon again in 1850, when he was elected.
