### LATEST NEWS.

FREDERICKSBURG. - No movement of troops on either side is reported at Fredericksburg. The grand army of Burnside is not there, evidently, or if there it is very quiet. Thus much in regard to the knowl edge of outsiders. At headquarters, however, it is said that Burnside's whereabouts and his movements are thoroughly known.

THE WHEREABOUTS OF BURNSIDE. + The Examiner of yesterday says, on official information, that General Hampton made the circuit of the enemy's lines and found him in heavy force on Bull Run and at Dumfries, evidently moving slowly towards Washington. The cavalry cut off and destroyed a large number of wagons belonging to his trains and took a few pris-

REPORTED REMOVAL OF BURNSIDE. It is again reported that Burnside has been removed and Fremont put in command. The New York Herald says, editorially, that Burnside's army, the finest and best appointed the sun ever shone upon, has been defeated and driven back by a parcel of ragamuffins, and suggests that the army go into winter quarters, at Washington, at once.

PRESIDENT DAVIS IN THE WEST -President Davis, on his recent visit to Tennessee, reviewed the army of the West at Murfreesboro'. Among the officers conspicuously mentioned as present, are Gens. Bragg, Hardee, Polk, Breckinridge and Cheatham. The. President and Gen. Joseph E. Johnston passed through Atlanta on Tuesday morning last, on their way to Jackson, Miss: The President will return by way of Savannah and Charleston, then by way of Wilmington and the east caost of North Carolina.

EVACUATION OF NASHVILLE .- It is reported that the enemy are evacuating Nashville in the direction of Bowling Green. They are removing their heavy guns across the river.

FROM EASTERN N. C .- There is no doubt that the enemy has fallen back to Newbern, foil ed in their late raid and whipped. They destroyed much property on the route, burned dwellings, outhouses, &c.

ARRIVAL OF A VALUABLE CARGO. - We are informed on reliable authority, that another vessel recently entered a Confederate port with a valuable cargo of guns, ammunition, medicines army stores, &c.

WHAT'S UP ?- A courier passed through this city yesterday with dispatches for the Confederate Government from Europe.

Why Burnslde withdrew his army. RICHMOND, Dec. 22.

The Dispatch has Northern dates to the 18th. Burnside telegraphed to Halleck as follows: The army was withdrawn to this side of the river because I felt that the position in front could not be carried, and 'twas a military necessity either to attack or refire. A repulse would have been disastrous to us. The army was withdrawn at night without the knowledge of the enemy and without loss either of property or men.

A E. BURNSIDE. [Signed] Northern correspondents, however, acknowledge a complete failure.

Highly Important from the North. RICHMOND, Dec. 22.

A special dispatch to the Enquirer brings Northern advices to the 20th. Seward and his son have both resigned and a reconstruction of the entire cabinet is probable. The

reason of this is the failure at Fredericksburg. On the 18th a committee of Republican Senators waited on Lincoln and asked for a reconstruction of the cabinet. Seward and his son immediately tendered ther resignations. They had not been accepted, but the Philadelphia Enquirer says they will be.

Blair will follow suit, and Halleck will be removed. The Washington Star gives the history of the Republican caucus, showing that steps were taken there for the reconstruction of the Cabinet, and thinks that all of Seward's colleagues will follow his example, The Philadelphia Inquirer has reports that Burnside

The Yankers admit a loss at Fredericksburg of 1,400 killed and 8,000 wounded.

## Further from the North.

PETERSBURG, Dec. 22. Norfolk dates to the 20th received, by which we get New York dates to the 18th and 19th, and the New York World of the 18th and 19th.

Nothing of interest from Norfolk. The World concedes the most terrible defeat of the war at Fredericksburg. It says the loss will rather exceed than come under 15,000, as previously stated. Meagher's brigade went in 1200 strong and but 250 could be f und next morning. Other brigades

The World says, editorially, "heaven help us! there seems to be no help in man, Our cause is perishing. Hope after hope has vanished. Now the only prospect is the very blackness of despare .-Here we are reeling back from the third campaign upon Richmond. Fifteen thousand of the Grand Army sacrificed at one swoop, and escaping only by a hair's bredth."

Burnside telegraphed from headquarters on the 18th, that the whole army had recrossed without loss of men or property; that it was found impossible to carry the crest of the hill, and recrossing became a military necessity. The World says, " the army will now go into win-

ter quarters because it can go nowhere else. A telegram from Cairo says, the iron-clad ram Cairo was blown up, 20 miles from the mouth of the Yazoo, on the 12th, by rebel torpedoes, and sunk in 40 feet of water. In 16 minutes she was a total loss.

The crew were saved. Two other gunboats in the rear escaped: Additional particulars of the battle oi Prairie Grove Ark., show the abolition loss in killed and wounded

to be 995. The rebel loss is 2,700. Several vessels of Banks' fleet have put into Hilton Head short of coal, disabled, &c. The troops on board had suffered much.

The Rebel Pirate Alabama was heard from on the 28th ult, when she was at Dominica, West Indies, whither she had gone in pursuit of of a schooner. The San Jocinto had been at Point Petro only a few days before, but had sailed for St. Thomas.
