Seward's Resignation Confirmed.

RICHMOND, Dec. 23. The Philadelphia Enquirer is received and fully confirms the resignation of Seward and the other news forwarded yesterday.

The Washington correspondent says, since the late disaster at Fredericksburg the feeling has grown strong, almost universal, that here must be a change in the cabinet and policy before the war can be prosecuted further.

Seward and his son still remain at their desks awaiting the appointment of their successors.

Further from the North.

The Richmond Enquirer has Northern da tes to the 22nd. The Hepald says, Seward and Chase have certainly resigned. Seward will not remain in it Halleck and Stanton are retained, and Chase will not remain if Seward quits.



Applications for exemption, must, in all cases, be made to the enrolling officer of the district; duplicate copies of said application being made in writing, duly sworn to before an acting Justice of the Peace and bearing the certificate of the Clerk of the Court, given under the County Seal and seat through the Colonel of the regiment. County Seal and sent through the Colonel of the regiment. An appeal may be taken from the decision of the enrolling officer to the Commandant of Conscripts.

V. All Conscripts engaged on Government works will be enrolled and returned to their said work.

DISAFFECTION OF THE BLACK REPUBLICAN .- The Washington Star says a majority of the Senate, in caucus on the 17th, adopted a resolution which as first prepared, declared a want of confidence on their part in the Secretary of State. This was modified so as to express to the President an unanimous, recommendation of a partial reconstruction of the Cabinet, The following history in connection with Seward's resignation is given by the Star :

The Republican party met in caucus on the 18th. when a resolution was introduced requesting Lincoln to dispence with Seward's services. On this proposition the caucus stood 16 for and 13 against it.

Finding unanimity unattainable on this or the many substitutes offered for it, the caucus adjourned until next day. On again meeting the resolution requesting the President partially to remodel his whole Cabinet was unanimously agreed to ; the Conservative Republicans regarding it as an invitation to the whole Cabinet to resign, and they confidentally expect, the Star says, that Lincoln will regard the recent unmistakable manifestations of popular sentiment as his guide in the necessary reconstruction.
