A Fight amongst the Yankees. AUGUSTA, Feb. 6.

A special dispatch to' the Augusta press. dated McMinnville; Tenn., 5th, States that a Ohio and a Federal Kentucky regiment, at Frankford, fought each other for half an hour. The result was eight Obioans killed, and seventeen wounded-five Kenturkians killed, and eleven wounded.

The Federal General, Reynolds' division, was moved to Alexandria, Tenn., yesterday, for the purpose of destroying the flouring Mills. A portion of Morgan's Cavalry fought them several hours, but owing to the enemy's force, had to fall back. "The enemy's loss, eleven killed and thirty-seven wounded, and twenty-six prisoners. Our loss was one wounded.





PURCHASE OF COTTON AND TOBACCO BY THE GOVERNMENT.

We have obtained the following statement of th turctases of cotton already made by the several agents of t e Government, up to the date of their last rep. rts.

69 507 bales, cost'g \$4,474.400 57 Total, Of the above amount, so far as the reports of agen s show \$46,920 75 have been paid in cash, and the remainder in bonds. No reports from Louisana. Texas and Florida have yet been received, and no reports from any agents for the month of December have reached the office in Richmond, but it is estimated, from letters received, that not less than \$250,000 bales including the number in the above statement, have, up to this time, been already purchased for the use of the Gevernment.

The average price paid on the purchase reported, is about 131 cents per pound, varying in different States, the average being lowest in Mississippi and Arkansas. The prices to 5- paid hereafter will be without doubt, considerably higher.

I aving been detailed for recruiting service by Majer General G. W. Smith, commanding the department of North Carolina. I am authorized to recieve volunteers and muster them into my company now in service in his command. The conscript law has been partially suspended so as to permit conscripts to volunteer in companies of their own selection, without passing through camps of instruction, and receive all bounty and other benefits provided by law for volunteers.

A full pardon, except as to forfeiture of pay for the period of unauthorized absence, has been proclaimed by the general commanding, to all enlisted men absent without eave, who may voluntarily return to their commands on or before the 10th day of February next. Those who full to return voluntarily are to be court martialed, and if found guilty of desertion are to he sentenced to death, present or absent.

All who are illegally absent are earnestly enjoined to return immediately to their commands and aid in driving back a merciless invader who would overrun our State. Let none think to evade the laws and remain at home while their friends and neighbors are fighting their battles as well as their own. The whole power of the Confederate and State governments is pledged to bring all such to jus-

The patriotic citizens of the country are appealed to, to aid by their counsels and influence in securing volunteers, and inducing the laggard to return to duty.
