A Fight amongst the Yankees.

Augusta, Feb. 6.

A special dispatch to the Augusta press, dated Monday, Feb. 5th, States that an Ohio and a Federal Kentucky regiment, at Frankford, fought each other for half an hour. The result was eight Ohioans killed, and seventeen wounded—five Kentuckians killed, and eleven wounded.

The Federal General, Reynolds' division, was moved to Alexandria, Tenn., yesterday, for the purpose of destroying the flouring Mills. A portion of Morgan's Cavalry fought there several hours, but owing to the enemy's force, had to fall back. The enemy's loss, eleven killed and thirty-seven wounded, and twenty-six prisoners. Our loss was one wounded.

New York Senatorial Election.

Richmond, Feb. 6.

Northern votes to the 4th, have been received by the Enquirer.

Erasmus Corning, was nominated by the Democrats in New York for Senator. On the 1st of Feb., the Enquirer received 64, Corning 62, Dix 1 Wood 1. On the 2d ballot; Dix 65, Corning 63. The Legislature then assembled in joint Convention, when Morgan was elected, receiving 86, Corning 70.

The Herald has a laudatory editorial predicting a consolidated despotism or a number of petty military republics in the North. It says, it will no longer do for the government at Washington to telegraph that our foreign relations are quite satisfactory. It thinks Napoleon means to kick up a muss, and in doing so will be aided by Spain. This, it says, is proved by the resignation of the Spanish Ministry, &c.

Confederate Congress.

Richmond, Feb. 6.

The Senate has passed the appropriation bill. The Supreme Court bill was further debated. In the House nothing important was done.

Mr. Kenner, reported a bill for funding the currency. Made the special order of the day for Tuesday next.

The Press Convention.

Augusta, Feb. 5.

The Press Convention adjourned today. It appointed a board of directors. The proceedings have not yet been published. Dr. R. W. Gibbs, of Columbia, was elected President of the Press Association of the Confederate States.

PURCHASE OF COTTON AND TOBACCO BY THE GOVERNMENT.

We have obtained the following statement of the purchases of cotton already made by the several agents of the Government, up to the date of their last reports.

Of the above amount, so far as the reports of agents show \$46,920 75 have been paid in cash, and the remainder in bonds. No reports from Louisiana, Texas and Florida have yet been received, and no reports from any agents for the month of December have reached the office in Richmond, but it is estimated, from letters received, that not less than \$50,000 bales including the number in the above statement, have up to this time, been already purchased for the use of the Government.

The average price paid on the purchase reported, is about 13 1/2 cents per pound, varying in different States, the average being lowest in Mississippi and Arkansas. The price to be paid hereafter will be without doubt, considerably higher.

Speaking of the Federal reverse at Fredericksburg a correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says: "I have not observed among Americans, Northern or Southern, residents of London, any such visible effects of elation and depression respectively, produced by any news from the seat of war, as those which have followed the news of Burnside's repulse before Fredericksburg."

"The Northerners seem struck down by it—knocked out of time—and hardly venture, for the moment, to express themselves with confidence of ultimate triumph which astonishes Englishmen." The Southern, or those of Southern proclivities, on the other hand, are flinging up their caps in irrepressible jubilee.

San Francisco dates of February 21 say the first section of the Pacific railway will be completed next summer, so that cars can run to the foot of the hills. Judge Cramer has decided that greenbacks are not a legal tender.

Leading articles of the New York Herald endeavor to show that France is attempting an embroglio with England and Spain, in calling upon England to give up to Spain the fortress of Gibraltar, and argue that the ill will growing out of such mistrust strengthen the aversion of England to interfere in the American question.

The Herald also notes the deplorable result of the capture of the Ariel in sending gold from California to Europe, the steamer Sonora having sailed from San Francisco with one million and a quarter dollars for England. It has also a powerful article jurgling McLellan's claims to the command of the army.

The cotton excitement in New York is described as marvellous. Such has been the advance in cotton goods, and so rapidly have they changed hands that the multiplied commissions on many merchants' stocks, in the past few days, have amounted to more than the original cost of the goods.

GEN. VAN DORN'S MOVEMENTS.—Gen. Van Dorn is reported to be advancing on Memphis with eight brigades. The Yankees say fifty thousand Confederates are at Holly Springs. Advices from Memphis report the people in a great state of anxiety, being on the constant lookout for raids in all directions.

Several officers from the Northwest, who recently resigned while on duty on the Southwest, have been dismissed without pay on the ground either of cowardice or being rascals.

88TH NORTH CAROLINA MILITIA.

RALEIGH, Feb. 2, 1863.

All citizens of Raleigh and that portion of Wake county within the limits of this regiment between the ages of eighteen and forty will present themselves to Capt. A. Landis, Enrolling Officer of this district, at the court house, on Tuesday, the 3d February or Saturday, the 7th February, or enrolment and detail. Detailed men, overseers, or holding substitutes, or exempt from any cause whatever are required to present their papers and their papers to be signed by Capt. ATTENTION!

Having been detailed for recruiting service by Major General G. W. Smith, commanding the new army of North Carolina, I am authorized to recruit and muster them into my company now in service in his command. The conscript law has been partially suspended so as to permit conscripts to volunteer in companies of their own selection, without passing through camps of instruction, and receive all bounty and other benefits provided by law for volunteers.

A full pardon, except as to forfeiture of pay for the period of unauthorized absence, has been proclaimed by the general commanding, to all enlisted men absent without leave, who may voluntarily return to their companies on or before the 10th day of February next. Those who fail to return voluntarily are to be court-martialed, and if found guilty of desertion are to be sentenced to death, present or absent.

All who are illegally absent are earnestly enjoined to return immediately to their commands and aid in driving back a merciless invader who would overrun our State. Let none think to evade the laws and remain at home while their friends and neighbors are fighting their battles with the invader of the whole Confederacy. The Confederate and State governments is pledged to bring all such to justice.

The patriotic citizens of the country are appealed to, to aid by their counsels and influence in securing volunteers, and to visit the sections of country, in which the 7th Regiment, N. C. troops are raised, for the purpose of gathering conscripts and volunteers, and conducting them to the regiment without passing through camp of instruction in the ordinary manner, for which the authority of the Secretary of War has been granted.

Very liberal inducements offered to those who may come forward and offer themselves for service.

All absentees from the army will report to me immediately, who wish to return to their companies and receive their full pay, and their full pay will be paid to them when they will be treated as deserters. Confederate States of America: In Confederate District Court, for the District of Cape Fear, in the District of North Carolina, at Salisbury, December Term, 1862.

GENERAL ORDERS. No. 63. I will not issue execution for costs, in satisfaction of any until three months after decrees, to enable defendants to pay into court without execution.

2nd. Defendants paying costs to Marshal, in Satisfaction of costs, will file in the several Clerks' Offices, on or before Spring Term, 1863, the receipts of Marshal, to enable the Clerks to ascertain what will be due for interest on the expiration of twelve months from the time of the decrees.

3rd. Defendants against whom decrees were entered at last Spring Term, will pay to the Receiver the interest that may accrue and remain unpaid, within three months after Spring Term, 1863, or execution will issue therefor; and they will be subjected to the costs of issuing and collecting the same.

4th. Receivers to whom decrees, in part or in whole, are paid, must immediately notify the Clerks of each payment and the Clerks will not issue execution when payments are thus made.

EXTRACT. WAR DEPARTMENT. AND R. EXP. GEN'S OFFICE. RICHMOND, July 31st, 1862.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 63. III. A Paragraph I. General Orders, No. 44, current series, is hereby revoked, and all paroled prisoners whose Regiments are in the East, will report at Richmond, Virginia, and those whose Regiments are in the West at Vicksburg, Mississippi.

IV. All seizures and impressions of every description of property whatever, and especially of arms and Ordnance stores belonging to the States of the Confederacy, are hereby prohibited, and officers of the U. S. Army are enjoined to abstain carefully from such seizures and impressions, and in case they are made by mistake, such officers are ordered to make prompt restitution.
