Death of Mr. Brame.

There are some men's lives that are so pure, so noble, so upright and so beneficent that the ending of such a life becomes a calamity upon a community. Such was the case in the death of Mr. Jno. M. Brame, of this county on last Saturday, Feb. 9th, 1901, at 1 o'clock p. m.

Mr. Brame was 76 years old. Nearly all of his life he was an exemplary and leading member of the M. E. Church, South, at Hebron. Mr. Brame had the confidence of our people as but few men have ever enjoyed. He was a justice of the peace for some forty years and was a member of Warren county's criminal court during its entire existence—other changes of the three justices of this court were frequent, but Mr. Brame was always elected.

He was buried last Sunday evening in the family grounds at his residence, and the reverence and respect in which he was held by our people was witnessed by the fact that there was present at his burial the largest crowd we ever remember to have seen in the country on such an occasion. Rev. E. H. Davis, his pastor, made exceedingly appropriate remarks, and his body was born to the grave by Messrs. G. R. Scoggin, H. A. Boyd, A. S. Webb, Wm. H. Palmer, Jas. W. Stewart and Capt. W. G. Coleman.

Warren has lost one of its very best citizens, and we all mourn with his children and grand children in their great loss.
