Death of Mr. Jacob Parker.

Last Monday, June 10th, 1901, Mr. Jacob Parker died suddenly at his residence in this town. Mr. Parker was 79 years old, and was well known and as highly respected as any man in Warren County. He was for a long while Warrenton's most prominent business man and in his younger days did an immense mercantile and cotton buying business.
 Mr. Parker had a fall several months ago that resulted in a fractured rib from which he suffered very much, but he continued to get about, and on Monday morning was down the streets greeting his friends as usual. He went to his residence about 12 o'clock noon and complained of a heaviness about his chest. He laid down upon his bed and before medical aid could be gotten he died.
 Mr. Parker was a member of the Baptist church and died in full hope of a blessed hereafter. He was buried from the Baptist church on Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock, in Fair View Cemetery by the side of his wife who preceded him to the grave only a few months. His pastor, Rev. T. J. Taylor conducted the burial services, assisted by Rev. B. S. Bronson. A very large crowd attended the burial services both at church and in the cemetery. The active pall bearers were Messrs. B. G. Green, C. C. Hunter, W. G. Rogers, J. L. M. Gardner, N. M. Palmer and J. L. Henderson. The honorary pall bearers were Messrs. H. B. Hunter, Sr., J. O. Drake, W. A. White, W. A. K. Falkener, H. Palmer, Sr., and Capt. W. G. Coleman. The floral tributes were numerous and very handsome.



Meeting of Warrenton Base Ball Association.

On June 10th, 1901, a meeting was held in the Court House at 4:30 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of organizing a Base Ball Club. Mr. H. A. Boyd was made chairman of the meeting and Gaston Foote, secretary.

The next business was the election of a captain for the team. Mr. G. A. Foote was nominated, but withdrew his name, at the same time nominating Mr. Will A. Graham. Mr. Graham's nomination was seconded and when it was put to the vote it was unanimously elected.

The next in order was the election of a manager. There were two nominations, Messrs. W. K. Barham and N. E. Johnson. It was voted by ballot and Barham was elected by a majority of nine votes.

It was then deemed very necessary that a soliciting committee be elected. Messrs. Cook and Graham were nominated and forthwith received their soliciting papers.

Mr. Foote then moved that the minutes be published in THE RECORD, which motion was carried.

There being no other business the meeting adjourned.
