The Dispensary Commissioners were in session yesterday hearing petitions for and against the establishment of a branch dispensary in the town of Littleton. Messrs. J. J. Myrick, T. R. Walker and Capt. Leach represented the establishment of a dispensary and Messrs. J. M. Rhodes and C. N. Wharton vigorously opposed the measure. 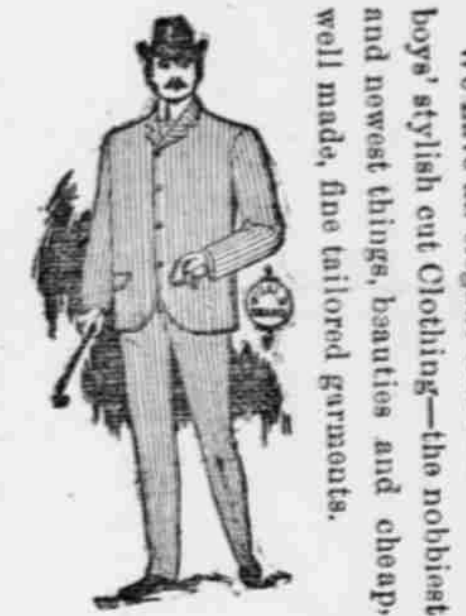
