Death of Mr. Goodloe.

Mr. Daniel R. Goodloe, aged 87 years and 8 months, died Sunday morning, Jan. 13th, 1902, at the residence of his niece, Mrs. Brame, at Vaughan.

He was a native of Louisa. In the early fifties he went to New York and was employed for a number of years as an editorial writer on The Times and as a contributor to other papers.

In 1878 he was appointed by President Johnson United States Marshal for the District of N. C. and held the office until Grant's second administration, when he was relieved of the office for having supported Greeley for President in 1872. He then located in Washington and wrote for several of the leading papers and magazines. When his health broke down under the weight of years and labors he returned to North Carolina and lived with relatives in Warrenton County.

His remains were met at Warren Plains by the following honorary pallbearers appointed by Hon. W. A. Burwell, Mayor of the town of Warrenton: H. B. Hunter, Sr., Judge C. A. Cook, Capt. W. J. White, Dr. C. A. Thomas, Judge W. A. White, W. J. Norwood, Jerry Draper, O. P. Shell, and Prof. John Graham accompanied by Mayor Burwell and Chief of Police, J. W. Allen.

The funeral exercises were held in the Episcopal Church and his remains were interred in Fairview cemetery.
