The town commissioners at their regular meeting last Tuesday night reported for the ensuing year Chief of Police, John W. Allen, and Treasurer, R. J. Jones. Both of these gentlemen have made faithful, efficient officers, and the Board did right in re-electing them. The report of Chief of Police, J. W. Allen, was fine, showing only three insolvent polls in the town.

No business of real interest was transacted, and there being so much matter for publication this week that we decided not to give our readers the minutes in full. Nothing but purely routine business was transacted and very little of that, and a few orders were allowed and ordered paid.

Our attention was drawn to the easy, smooth way in which the W. R. B. engine has been running the past few days. The improvement was so marked, and knowing that the engine had not been off for repairs, we asked engineer J. L. Curl what caused it, and he told us and showed us what he had done for the engine. It has been newly lunked up and runs as smooth and nice as when new. All this was done here without sending it to any machine shops, and shows that Capt. Curl is the right man in the right place, for if he had not been capable to do this work, the engine would have been sent to the shops for repairs and would have cost the company a lot of money.

We consider ourselves very fortunate in receiving three beautiful paper weights sent us by Mr. J. Walter Cook from Athens, Greece. They are prized very highly because of the historic places from which they were taken. One piece of marble was taken from the Temple of the six Virgins. Another weight with three kinds of marble, all three pieces were taken from the Palace of the Acropolis; the third weight is a chip of rock from Mar's Hill, the spot where Paul preached his famous sermon as recorded in Acts xvi. Mr. Cook, a Warren countyman, who is on the U. S. S. Nashville, touched at Athens, Greece, in Feb. and obtained these historic weights with his own hands, had them polished and sent to us. We prize them very highly and never expect to part with them.

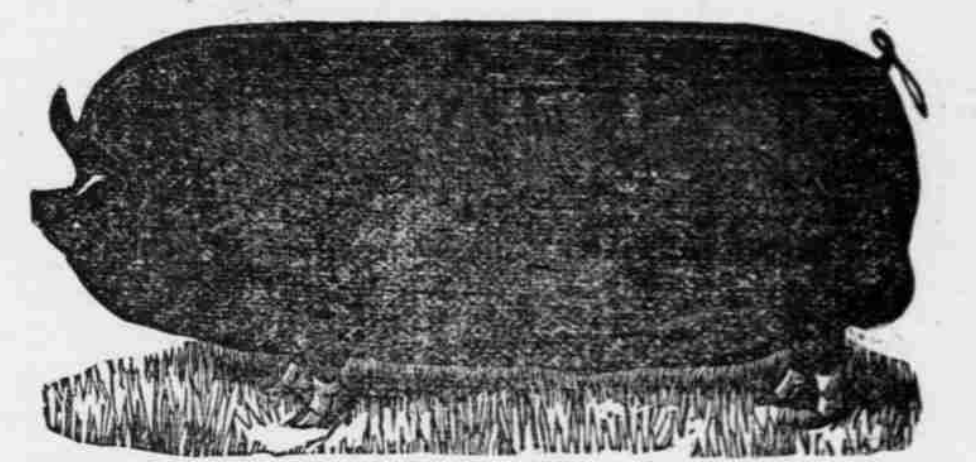
