For the benefit of those who do not know the law the street committee of our town ordered the following published:—Sec. 31. The Supt. of Schools occupies the room just opposite the clerk's office—the Sheriff's old office. The third door on the right—the former Register of Deeds office—has been fitted up as an office for the county Board of commissioners in which to hold meetings. The arrangements are the best we have ever had, and every thing is as neat and clean as can be.  
Warren County had four full fledged graduates from the male colleges of our State this year, and each of the four young gentlemen hold diplomas from different schools. Mr. J. J. Marshall, of Vaughan, graduated from the Blind Institute at Raleigh; Mr. Buxton Barker Williams, of Ridgeway, son of Dr. and Mrs. T. B. Williams, graduated from the University; Rev. W. H. Brown, of Warrenton, graduated from Trinity College, and Mr. B. H. Browning, of Littleton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Browning, graduated from Wake Forest College. These are all fine young men, and we rejoice at their high standing and the success that has attended their efforts to get a real first-class education. We hope that sufficient inducements will be offered these young men, thoroughly equipped for life's work, to locate permanently in Warren. We need their labors and efforts. This is a good showing for Warren, and if we can do as well every year it will not be long before the county will feel the good influences of a well trained intellectual citizenship. There may be some young lady graduates in Warren this year, but we do not recall any just now.

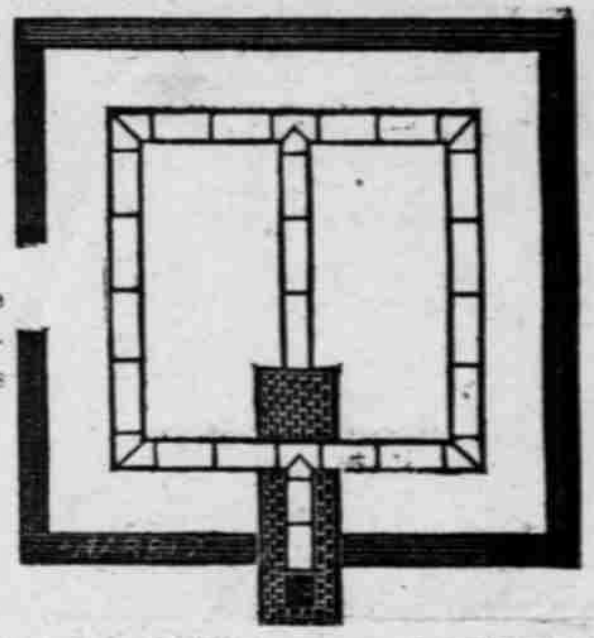

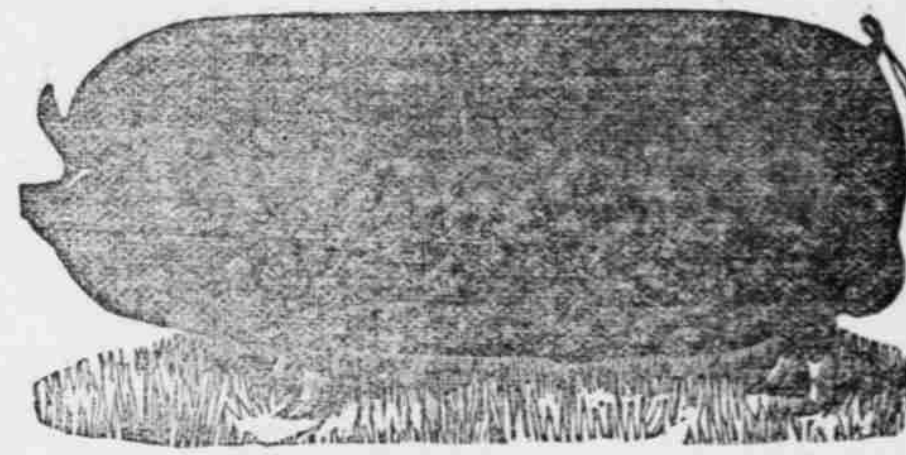
