Death of Mr. Loughlin.

Mr. J. J. Loughlin, who for a long number of years was a resident of our town but recently of Greensboro, N. C., died here last Saturday evening, July 19th 1902, at 8:30 o'clock. He had been in feeble health for sometime. After taking his bed here he gradually sank till death came. He came here from Greensboro about a week before his death to join his wife who was on a visit to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Haisheok.

Mr. Loughlin was twice married. His first wife was a daughter of Mr. J. R. Johnson, deceased, a prominent business man of our town. By this union he had four children who survive him; one son, Capt. J. J. Loughlin, of Durham, and three daughters; Mrs. Tunstall, of this county, Mrs. Matry and Miss Minnie Loughlin, of Greensboro.

His second wife, Miss Mollie Haisheok survives him with no children.
Mr. Loughlin was a brave Confederate soldier and kind hearted man. He was 65 years old. He was buried from the Episcopal Church here and interred in Fairview Cemetery Sunday evening.

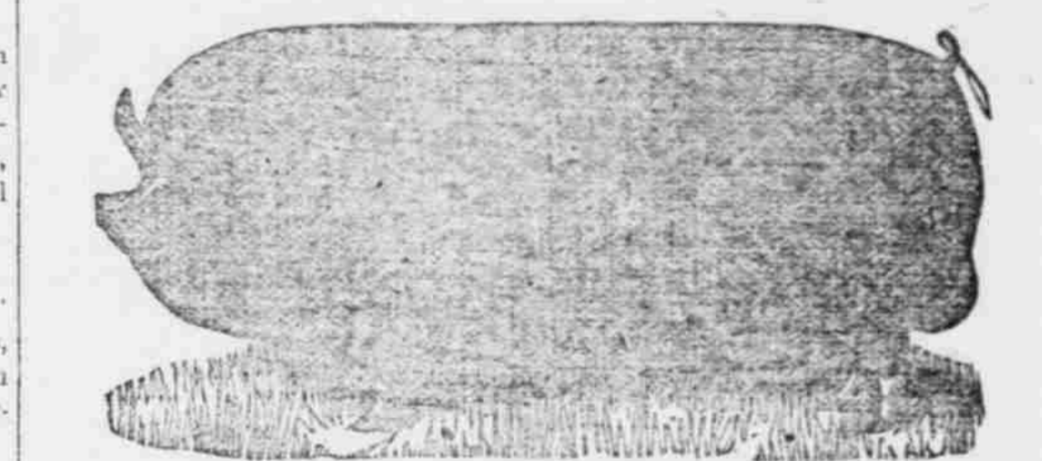
