## DEMOCRATIC BALLY.

Had the Independents and Republicans heard the speeches of the true-blue Democrats at Vaughan on Wednesday they would have slunk away in disgust. They would have been frightened at their own pictures—word pictures, to be more explicit, which were faithfully portrayed by such men as Charles Kitchin, Tasker Polk and John H. Kerr. The occasion was a barbecue given by the Democrats of Judkins and River townships of Warren county.

The first speaker was Tasker Polk, Esquire, of Warrenton. He was introduced by J. A. Dowlin and traced the history of North Carolina politics from the days of 1835 to the present. He was outspoken about the little cloud of Independentism that for a time threatened to overcast the political sky but which has now been dispelled by the hot Democratic sun. He gave utterance to great truth when he said that Independents and Republicans were one and the same evil under different names.

Mr. H. B. Hunter, Jr., who by the way will be our next State Senator, introduced Mr. H. Kerr, Esq., of Warrenton, who delivered a strong speech in favor of pure, Jeffersonian Democracy maintained by the treason of Independentism. At the conclusion of Mr. Kerr's speech a most important announcement was listened to with peculiar interest. Mr. M. E. Newsome, Littleton, mentioned that our losses had provided a way whereby we might stay the inner man. Six hundred men, women and boys eagerly demolished the trays of Barbecue and Brunswick Show and felicity was in evidence. In order that the audience might be brought together and quieted for the admirable address that followed, the Editor of THE RECORD was put up for a speech. Protesting his inability to make a public speech did no good. He had eaten dinner and must pay for it and the committee would entertain no refusal. They evidently learned that he couldn't speak and it didn't take long to convince them. The Editor spoke about three minutes, mentioning everything from the flood to the post-ent time and nothing in particular. However, it gave the people a chance to see him and know who he was.

The climax of the day was reached when the Hon. Claude Kitchin was introduced by the Hon. S. G. Daniel, member of the Legislature from Warren county. Mr. Kitchin is the present able representative from this Congressional district and has been nominated to succeed himself, and will surely be elected. For two hours Mr. Kitchin denounced trusts and monopolies, exposed the Independents, and whipped out the Republicans. We were glad to hear such forcible utterances that fell like hot shot. We were only sorry we could not see the Republicans squirm and writhe under the denunciation.
