There are 9,204,531 negroes in the United States, including Porto Rico and Hawaii. Nine tenths of them live in the South—one third of its population. Seventy seven per cent. work on 746,000 farms, of which twenty-one per cent. are absolutely, and four per cent. partially owned by negroes. There are 21,000 negro carpenters, 20,000 barbers and nearly as many doctors, 16,000 ministers, 15,000 masons, 12,000 dress-makers, 10,000 engineers and firemen, 5,000 shoemakers, 4,000 musicians, 2,000 actors and showmen, 1,000 lawyers which seem too many. Since 1890 negro illiteracy has sunk from 57 to 44.5 per cent. Statistics are rather stupid fellows but these look bright and full of hope—"With the Progression," Everybody's Magazine for February.
