Sale of Lands by Commissioner.

By virtue of the authority conferred on me by a decree of the Superior Court of Warren County, State of North Carolina, rendered on the 25th day of Sept. 1905, in a special proceeding pending therein entitled: Mary B. Russell (the three last named being minors and represented by R. B.
