Dr. Hume's Lecture.

On Friday night, November the 10th, a large and appreciative audience assembled in the Auditorium of Warrenton High School building to hear a lecture by that distinguished educator and lecturer, Dr. Thomas Hume, of the Chair of English in our State University.

After a brief, humorous introduction by Rev. T. J. Taylor, Dr. Hume announced as his subject: "Practical Morals and a Little Religion in Shakespeare." Before he finished the audience was convinced that Shakespeare's conception of morals was of the highest and purest order, and that his religion was positive, biblical and helpful. The lecturer dwelt with striking force upon the historic and moral teachings of the historical plays which begin with King John and end with Henry the eighth. His illustrations drawn from King Lear, Julius Caesar, measure for measure, Midsummer Nights' Dream, Romeo and Juliet, and Merry Wives of Windsor were strikingly beautiful and appropriate, and mark him master of the wonderful productions of the world's greatest dramatist.
