A New Bank Organized.

The Citizen Bank, of Warrenton, has been chartered by the Secretary of State, to do a general banking business under the laws of North Carolina. The authorized capital stock is \$50,000, with a paid up capital of \$20,000. The subscribers are R. B. Boyd, M. P. Burwell, W. G. Rogers, W. B. Boyd, R. T. Watson, B. G. Green and others.

We are informed that the officers will be W. B. Boyd, president, M. P. Burwell, vice president, and R. T. Watson, cashier.

The names of the stockholders and officers as given above are enough to assure success to this enterprise from the beginning. They are business men well known to the people throughout the county.

This bank will succeed the old reliable private banking firm of Gardner & Jefferson on the first day of January.

Will Build.

The Bank of Warren has bought from Dr. J. G. King and Mr. J. L. Rodwell the two stores on Main street, now occupied by J. H. Harris and E. B. Cooper & Son, and will in the early spring tear out these wooden buildings and replace them with an up-to-date bank building. The Record has advocated for a long time the tearing out of these old fire traps and putting up brick buildings. We consider this good news. This will be a nice location for the bank of Warren. The front door of the bank will be right opposite the front door of the Court House. We congratulate the bank on getting this location.

Court Adjourned Saturday.

The special term of Warren Superior Court, which was in session here the whole of last week, adjourned at noon on Saturday.

Judge B. F. Long presided over the court, and won golden opinions from our citizens. He is a able, impartial, and just judge; and the people of our county would be glad to have him preside over our courts during the remainder of his life.

The most important case tried was that of Hicks and Jarrell, colored, for killing Gilbert King, white. Solicitor Daniel was assisted by Messrs. J. H. Kerr, S. G. Daniel, and Tasker Polk, in the prosecution, and the aide of the State was most ably presented by these gentlemen. The defendants were most ably defended by B. G. Green, Esq., Judge W. A. Montgomery, and C. O. Harris, Esq. One of the best juries Warren County could produce tried the case and were unable to decide whether Hicks was guilty of murder in the first or second degree; but found Jarrell guilty of murder in the second degree. The judge withdrew a juror, and entered a mistrial in the case of Hicks and sentenced Jarrell to the Penitentiary for twenty-five years.

The Record will not publish its impressions with reference to this case, and the good citizens of the county ought to refrain from discussing it, as the defendant Hicks will have to stand before another jury and be tried for his life in February.
