Waste in Lumbering Southern Appalachian Forests.

The forests of the Southern Appalachian Mountains have been cut so eagerly for the valuable hardwoods they contain that very little virgin timber is left and about 85 per cent of the area is second growth.

The drain of these forests by many industries is immense. The lumberman are going over the land for the third time. First they took only the prime oak and poplar saw timber. Next they took the oaks that were suited for barrel staves. Now they are after whatever merchantable trees are left, such as birch, chestnut, and gum.

Moreover, these forests have been, and still are, logged very wastefully. Nearly three-quarters of the timber cut for ties is wasted. Double or even treble the number of ties now cut could readily be secured from the same area without injury to the forest. By simply taking all the suitable trees, 125 ties could be cut from an acre which now yields only 30, and if all the wood in the trees were fully utilized 170 additional ties per acre could be secured.

With mine timbers the story is the same. Fully 40 per cent of the timber handled in procuring them is entirely wasted.

Finally, fires are injuring the productiveness of the Appalachian forests by running over the ground and killing young growth.

Circular 118, just published by the Forest Service, discusses the whole question of managing to better advantage the second growth forests of the Appalachian region. This publication can be obtained of the Forester at Washington.

Cotton Picker Invented.

Mr. C. R. Harving, of Manning, S. C., has invented and patented a cotton picking machine which gives encouraging promise of doing the work for which it is designed. The whole apparatus is to be carried on a specially designed four-wheel truck and drawn by horse power along the cotton rows. The principle on which the machine works is something like that of the familiar suction flue at the modern ginneries. A gasoline engine on the forward part of the truck furnishes the power to run a pair of twin fans that do the suction work, while connection with the fans are four or more flexible tubes, or hose that may be guided along the rows of open cotton by unskilled labor. The force of suction will draw up in the flue all well opened cotton while a special device will pick open cotton that does not come freely from the boll. Mr. Harving has not made a complete machine, according to his design, but has rigged up an ordinary farm wagon an outfit that demonstrates his idea to be practicable. Being necessarily engaged in other business Mr. Harving has had little time to devote to his important invention, but he hopes soon to organize a stock company with sufficient capital to push the matter in a manner that its importance deserves.

Fear Jack London is Lost in the Pacific.

The editors of Woman's Home Companion, for whom Jack London is sailing around the world in his little boat Snark, state that he is now over a month due at Tahiti of the Society Islands, for which place he sailed from Hilo, Hawaii, on October 27th.

The gas engine with which the Snark is equipped was not working well when Mr. London left Hawaii, and it is supposed by his publishers that he has experienced some more trouble with it, or that he has encountered the doldrums of the Pacific, by which the little forty-five-foot boat might be buffeted about for days or weeks, to be dropped at length into a sea dead calm. For such are the equatorial doldrums.

London sailed from San Francisco on May 4th, and reached Hawaii about a month later. He is accompanied on his voyage around the world by his wife, a captain, an engineer, one sailor and two Japanese servants. London expects to spend seven years on his voyage and to sail completely around the world, stopping at interesting places wherever he goes.

No Time for fireworks.

The mountainous waves threatened to engulf the struggling ship at any moment. The captain ordered a box of sky-rockets and flares brought to the rail, and with his own hands ignited them, in the hope that they would make known his distress to some passing ship.
