THE DISTRICT CONVENTION—
THE NOMINATIONS.

We attended the Democratic and Conservative Convention which assembled at Statesville on yesterday for the purpose of nominating a candidate to represent this District in the next Congress, and also for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Presidential Elector for this District. Never did we witness greater harmony in any public assemblage than pervaded that body. The Convention was largely attended—ten of the twelve counties composing the District being represented.

Col. John M. Long, of Cabarrus, was President of the Convention, and E. A. Osborne, of Mecklenburg County. It was agreed that each county should cast the number of votes to which it is entitled to delegates in the House of Representatives, and that two-thirds should be requisite to effect a nomination. The counties were called on for nominations, when Iredell presented the name of John H. McLaughlin, Wilkes the name of R. F. Arnfield, Yadkin the name of A. C. Cowles, Davie and Union the name of Z. B. Vance, and Rowan the names of W. M. Robbins and Francis L. Shober.

Three votes were then had for the nomination. The first vote was divided between all the names presented. On the second, Mr. Shober's vote increased, and on the third he was unanimously nominated. In response to loud calls Mr. Shober then came forward and accepted the nomination in brief, but chaste and eloquent speech. After Mr. Shober had concluded his remarks the name of W. M. Robbins was proposed for Presidential Elector when he was nominated by acclamation. He also accepted the nomination in a brief but forcible speech.

Of these nominations it is scarcely necessary to speak. Mr. Shober is well known to the people of this District as an able and effective debater, a fine scholar and an urbane, popular and accomplished gentleman. Maj. Robbins is also well known to them as a gentleman of high character, and as one of the best political speakers in North Carolina.

Up to the last moment hopes had been entertained by many that our present Representative, Hon. N. Boyden, whose course at the last session gave such universal satisfaction, would announce his intention to support the nominees of the New York Convention. In that event he would have been unanimously renominated. We even believe that he would have been re-nominated if he had been known to be neutral. But the delegates to the

Convention learning from one of their number, who had a personal interview with Mr. Boyden but a few days before, that he was *certainly* for Grant and Colfax his name was not mentioned in that body. It is understood that Mr. Boyden will be an independent candidate for Congress, and that he will publish a card announcing the fact in a few days.

Mr. Shober, we learn, will commence the canvass at once, and will address the people of Catawba, at Newton, on next Monday, and the people of Davie, at Mocksville, on next Tuesday.

LATEST NEWS.

From Washington.

Washington, Sept. 1, M.

Quite a number of Southern Post Offices have been discontinued in the South from causes which can easily be remedied.

The Post Office Department desires advice from parties of the several Post Offices discontinued of acceptable persons who can take the oath. Clerks, agents and authors are excluded by law from charge of Post Offices, but can act as assistants.

The President proclaims the ratification of the treaty between the United States and Nicaragua. It is of a liberal character of friendship, commerce and navigation.

Elections.

Washington, Sept. 1, P. M.

The Wilmington municipal election was a warm contest. The vote is largely increased. The Republicans re-elected their Mayor by an increased majority of one hundred.

New York, Sept. 1, P. M.

The Vermont election resulted in the success of the Republicans by a largely increased majority over last year.

Returns from a third of the State indicate the majority at twenty-seven thousand. Some make it a thirty thousand vote—the heaviest thrown since 1860.

From Washington.

From Georgia—The Legislature.

Atlanta, Sept. 1, P. M.

In the House, a resolution passed, regulating the discussion on negro eligibility, allowing each negro one hour for defence and the members participating twenty-five minutes. The eligibility discussion costs the tax payers of Georgia two thousand dollars, daily.

From New York—Arrests.

Warrants were issued, to-day, for the arrest of prominent Revenue officials here. Charges not made public. Ex-Collector Smith was arrested.

From South Carolina.

Columbia, Sept. 1, P. M.

The House sustained the Governor's veto of the Charleston City Charter bill,—an extreme Radical party measure.
