LATEST NEWS.

From San Francisco.
San Francisco, Oct. 23, M.—A heavy earthquake occurred here at 8 o'clock, this morning—motion from East to West. The damage was confined to the lower part of the city, below Montgomery Street, among old buildings on made ground. The Custom House, which was badly injured in 1865, is now considered unsafe. The officials have removed to the Internal Revenue building. Business in the lower part of the city is suspended; the streets are thronged and there is great excitement. Parapet walls and chimneys of many buildings fell, causing some loss of life. The damage will not exceed one million of dollars. The shock was severe at Oakland, damaging many buildings. The earth opened in several places, emitting sulphurously. The Court House at San Leandro was demolished, killing one. The shock was very severe at San Jose, and buildings were damaged.

From Washington.
Washington, Oct. 23, P. M.—The Secretary of the Treasury has rejected the nomination of John T. Ciesmar, for North and South Carolina, and John F. Patterson, for Tennessee, as Revenue Supervisors.

On the question whether doubled distilled whiskey must pay double tax, Everts, the Secretary and Rollins fall to agree.

General Hancock has departed for his new Headquarters in New York.

It is stated that Grant will not return till after the Presidential election.

Commodore C. H. Poor has been promoted to Rear Admiral, vice Hobb, retired.

More Negro Outrages.
Mobile, Oct. 22, P. M.—A white woman, sixty years of age, was assaulted and ravished by three negroes, in the out-skirts of the city, on yesterday, in broad daylight. Her life is in serious danger from injuries inflicted. Citizens are in pursuit of the negroes.

A market-man was assaulted by negroes yesterday morning, a short distance from the city, and was mortally wounded by a musket shot. While insensible, he was robbed of everything, even to his shoes.

Foreign.
New York, Oct. 23, P. M.—The steamer Rising Star, with a quarter of a million and Panama dates of the 14th, has arrived.

The great tidal wave, which started from Peru, on August 13th, reached Australia, the next day, with a simultaneous earthquake. No serious damage.

Private dispatches from San Francisco say that the earthquake damages will not exceed three hundred thousand dollars.
