### LATEST NEWS.

#### FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15, P. M.  
In the Supreme Court Charles O'Connor is arguing in favor of the taxability of certificates of indebtedness, held by banks.

**CONGRESS**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 15, M.  
SENATE.—A bill punishing the holding of office, contrary to the 14th Amendment, is up.

Ferry is speaking in favor of the bill.

The House proceedings are unimportant.

#### FROM RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, Dec. 15th, M.  
In the case of Jeter Phillips, sentenced to be hung on next Friday, for the murder of his wife, a *habeas corpus* was known on day of Sale.

**corpus**, returnable Feb. 9th, was granted to day by Judge Underwood on a plea by counsel, that the Court of Appeals, which decided against the appeal taken in the Phillips case, was not a legal Court—the Judges being disqualified under the 14th Amendment.

#### CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15, P. M.  
SENATE.—A bill repealing the act forbidding the militia in the reconstructed States, except Georgia, passed.

Stewart's bill, making the holding office violatory of the 14th Amendment, was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

HOUSE.—The Judiciary Committee was directed to report a bill enforcing the 3rd section of the 14th Amendment.

Wirtz introduced a resolution vacating all offices in the unreconstructed States. Objection.

The Speaker announced a special Committee to investigate the New York election frauds.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the tariff.

Brooks charges that half a million was contributed by the Union Leagues of New York and Philadelphia to carry the anti-tariff States.

Without definite action the House adjourned.

Political affairs are still unsettled, and throughout the country trade of every description is at a stand still.
