WILL THE RECONSTRUCTION ACTS STAND?

We prefer to argue this not as a question of law but of probability. It divides itself into two parts. First, whether these acts will stand if the Supreme Court should not pass upon them; and secondly, whether the Congress on that point pronounces its will.

Independently of possible decisions by that court, it is probable that the great majority of the Southern whites, and a large portion of the Northern people, believe the Reconstruction Acts unconstitutional, and are likely to change their belief. The Southern whites, when they see that the Reconstruction Acts are not to be enforced, will not only refuse to obey them, but will also endeavor to prevent their enforcement by all the means in their power.

Supreme Court. Washington, Jan. 21.—In the case of *Ex parte* Cannon, Chief Justice Chase announced that a majority of the Justices thought that the motion of the appellant should be allowed, and ordered that the case be advanced on the docket and argued for a hearing on the first Monday in March.

In the case of the Commonwealth of Virginia vs. West Virginia, the Chief Justice announced that the court was equally divided, also upon the order, which shall be made in consequence of division.
