Canby and has been laid before the Public Treasurer, Acting in accordance with his own judgment and the counsel of others whose opinions he respects, we learn that the Public Treasurer will obey Gen. Canby's order. HDQR'S 2nd MILITARY DIST., CHARLESTON, S. C., Feb. 12th, 1865. GENERAL ORDERS, No. 20. The Constitutional Convention assembled in North Carolina, under the authority of the laws of the United States, having, in conformity with the eighth Section of the law of March 2d, 1867, (supplementary to the law of March 2, 1867, "To provide for the more efficient government of the rebel States.") by an Ordinance adopted in Convention on the sixth day of February, 1868, provided for the levy and collection of a tax of one twentieth of one per cent, on the real and personal property in the State, to raise monies to pay the expenses of said Convention; and having directed that the tax so provided for shall be paid into the Treasury of the State in reimbursement for advances made from the said Treasury, for the purpose of defraying the current expenses of the Convention, and contingent accounts: It is ordered.

Wall Paper Superseded.

According to the Boston Transcript a man in Cambridge, Massachusetts, has made a new invention by which wood hanging will take the place of paper hanging. The Transcript says: "A very delicate simple and beautiful machine has been constructed, which will take a portion of a wall, and cut it into thin ribbons, and which will draw it up into thin ribbons as wide as a roll of ordinary paper, making one hundred or one thousand feet of it to the inch. These rolls of wood are placed on the walls by paperhangers with paste and brush, precisely in the same manner with paper. The wood is well dried, and ready for use, and the paper, being so thin, is much more tough and pliable. In these days, when safety is sought for one can finish the walls of his house with different woods to suit his taste. One room can be finished in hard maple, another in mahogany, and so on. Thus he can ornament his house with real and genuine marble and wood.
