FROM WASHINGTON.

The Refusal of the Senate to Allow Time to the President's Counsel—Views of a Conservative Senator—No Hope for Relief but in Reconciliation—Stevens clinging to confederation—The Witnesses against Mrs. Surratt and others.

Washington, March 27.—The action of the Senate in refusing counsel time to prepare for the defense of the President is regarded as not only unfair to the President but positively insulting to the distinguished gentlemen who had stated upon their professional reputation that the case was for actually necessary.

The result has been that Mr. Evans was forced to seek his own library in New York, and will not return until Monday morning, while the rest of the counsel are laboring here on the different points involved in the case.

The discussion in the House on the Supreme Court bill, voted by the President, was restricted to one hour, and that hour Mr. Wilson paraded out to suit himself; then the bill was passed over by the same vote by which it was originally smothered through that body.

These legislative progresses here, each act of Congress being worse, if possible than the one which preceded it. The gravest legislation is attended with mocking jeers of Radicals over a helpless minority.

A Conservative Senator, noted for his caution, as well as his great ability, declared to-night that there was no escape for the country from its present political bondage, excepting in revolution, which he regards as near at hand.

Stevens still clings to the idea of confederation, and he asked the Chairman if the Ways and Means committee had made any provision for lightening the burdens of taxation at the North by providing for a general confederation at the South?

Stevens asked the gentleman a question and he answers with a sneer. Schenck again replied, in a boisterous tone, recalling to the minds of many the fable of the dead lion.

It is understood that Stevens will bring in another scheme for general confederation before the session closes, should death not arrest him before he completes his plan.

One by one the swift witnesses of Mr. Bingham and Judge Holt on the conspiracy trial fall into the clutches of the law. Conover, Ashley's friend in the Penitentiary, is awaiting a new trial, having been once convicted of a infamous crime. Baker is a fugitive from justice, and to-day a warrant issued for Richard Montgomery, charged with embezzlement.

These are the parties upon whose testimony Eric Surratt and others were convicted and executed.

Washington, March 31, M.—Judge Black, on yesterday, in the Supreme Court, desired to know what effect the recent legislation had on the McCord case.

During the colloquy, Judge Grier said he felt called upon to vindicate himself from whatever obloquy or censure may be attached to any one in this matter,—that he thought the failure to decide the McCord case will be considered as a design, on the part of the court, to wait for legislation to relieve them from the performance of an unpleasant duty.

CONGRESS. WASHINGTON, March 28.—The President was asked whether he has established a new military district since August, and under what name.

The tax conference committee report was rejected. Mr. Nye said it would fill the penitentiaries with government officials, and Mr. Howe said that would be a good thing. Morrill said he did not believe there was an honest distiller in the United States.

House.—The Alabama admission bill was resumed and discussed at great length. A motion to table it was defeated by 103 to 90. A motion to strike out the second section was carried by a vote of 74 to 33. Stevens' amendment for universal suffrage was rejected without a division.

Mr. Spaulding's substitute was adopted—77 to 14. It declares the Montgomery constitution to be the legal basis. The provisional government officers recently elected are to qualify and enter on the discharge of their duties on the first of May.

CONVENTION.

The expenses we learn from the Public Treasurer, already paid, are \$77,165. The changes for printing the Constitution, and other printing changes, are not yet presented.

1. Expenses of General Assembly. The General Assembly must meet within 15 days after the acceptance of the Constitution by Congress. They will, of course, vote themselves \$3 per day, use three more than has been usual heretofore.

2. Salaries of the officers. More offices have been created than heretofore. For example: 1. Superintendent of Public Works. 2. Superintendent of Public Instruction. 3. Attorney General. 4. Superior Court Judges. 5. Commissioners to revise the laws.

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
