Immediately after the enrollment hereby ordered shall have been completed, the said officers of the temporary force are further instructed and commanded to give public written notice at three or four public places in each district of their counties, commanding all persons enrolled and sub-ject to militia duty, to assemble at a certain time and place, near the centre of each district, for the purpose of electing the dommissioned and non-commissioned officers of the different companies, which elec-tions will be held as prescribed in Revised Code, chapter 70, entitled Militia, There sult of these elections shall then be committed to writing, certified to and signed by said officers of the temporary force, and forwarded to these Headquarters on or before the 6th day of June next, when the officers elect will be commissioned by the

The officers of the temporary force aforesaid are instructed, in order to the more effectual and speedy execution of the provisions of this order, to meet together, immediately after the reception of this order, to apportion the districts among them-selves, and to adopt a uniform plan for the enrollment and holding the elections herein

A bill to be entitled An Act to establish a Scale of Depreciation of Confederate Currency.

Whenkas, By an ordinance of the Convention, entitled "An ordinance declaring what Laws and ordinances are in force, and for other purposes," ratified on the 18th day of October, A. D. 1865, it is made the duty of the General Assembly to provide a scale of depreciation of the Confederate currency from the time of its first issue to the end of the war; and it is further therein declared that "all executory contracts, solvable in money, whether under seal or not, made after the depreciation of said currency before the let day of May, 1865, and yet unfilled, (except official bonds and psual bonds payable to the State,) shall be deemed to have been made with the understanding that they were solvable in money of the said currency," subject nevertheless to evidence of a different intent of the parties to the contract; therefore, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same." That the following scale of degreeration be and the same is hereby adopted and established as the measure of value of one gold dollar in Confederate currency, for each month, and the fractional parts of the month of December, 1864, from the lat day of November 1861, to the lat day of May, 1865, to wit:
