A PROCLAMATION. By His Excellency DAVID S. REID, Governor of

the State of North Carolina. WHEREAS, three-fifths of the whole number of members of each House of the General Assembly did at the

last session pass the following Act: AN ACT TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF NORTH CAROLINA. WHEREAS. The freehold qualification now required for the electors for members of the Senate conflicts with the funda-

mental princ ples of liberty; Therefore Sec. 1, Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, three-fifths of the whole number of members of each House concurring, that the second clause of third section of the first Article of the amended Constitution ratified by the people of North Carolina on the second Monday of November, A. D., 1835, be amended by striking out the words "and possessed of a freehold within the same district of fifty acres of land for six months next before and at the day of election," so that the said clause of said section shall read as follows: All free white men of the age of twenty-one years (except as is hereinafter declared) who have been inhabitants of any one district within the State twelve months immediately preceding the day of any election and shall have paid public taxes, shall be entitled to vote for a member of

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That the Governor of the State be, and he is he eby directed, to issue his Proclamation to the people of North Carolina, at least six months before the next election for members of the General Assembly, setting forth the purport of this Act and the amendment to the Constitution herein proposed, which Proclamation shall be accompanied by a true and perfect copy of the Act, authenticated by the certificate of the Secretary of State, and both the Proclamation and the copy of this Act, the Governor of the State shall cause to be published in all the newspapers of this State, and posted in the Court Houses of the respective Counties in this State, at least six months before the election of members to the next General Assembly.

Read three times and agreed to by three-fifths of the whole number of members of each House respectively, and ratified in General Assembly, this the 24th day of January 1851.
