STEDMAN NEWS

RALEIGH, Feb. 23.—Ed Cotter, progressive Negro farm leader of the Stedman community in Cumberland County, is taking advantage of production know-how and new markets to increase his family farm income in 1951.

Last October Cotter was persuaded by H. A. Johnson, Negro county agent in Cumberland for the State College Extension Service, to take home a bushel of the new Arlington oats and plant them beside some of his own kind of oats.

A recent check shows that the new variety is doing fine. The field has been top-dressed according to recommendations of the Extension Service.

Cotter hopes to develop into small grain production and grow both feed and seed. County Agent Johnson is encouraging him to follow the Arlington oats with a crop of Ogden soybeans and thereby put his small grain land into growing two crops a year. The small grain-soybean rotation has been found quite profitable in tests at McCullers Branch Experiment Station in Wake County.
