But the negotiations already had been suspended for one full day, while soldiers died on the fighting line, and quick Red action was necessary to permit a resumption today.

The Reds stopped a truck convoy containing 20 newsmen, along with other UN personnel, nine miles south of Kaesong. The trucks turned back. When it became evident the Reds did not intend to admit the correspondents, Joy sent his ultimatum. It was believed Joy acted on instructions from Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, supreme UN commander. And it was assumed Ridgway may have had direct orders from Washington and the UN regarding the Allied attitude.
