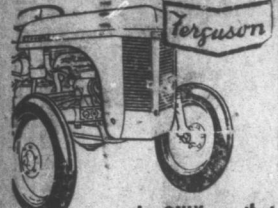

Mr. M. O. Phillips and family spent last weekend at Carolina Beach.

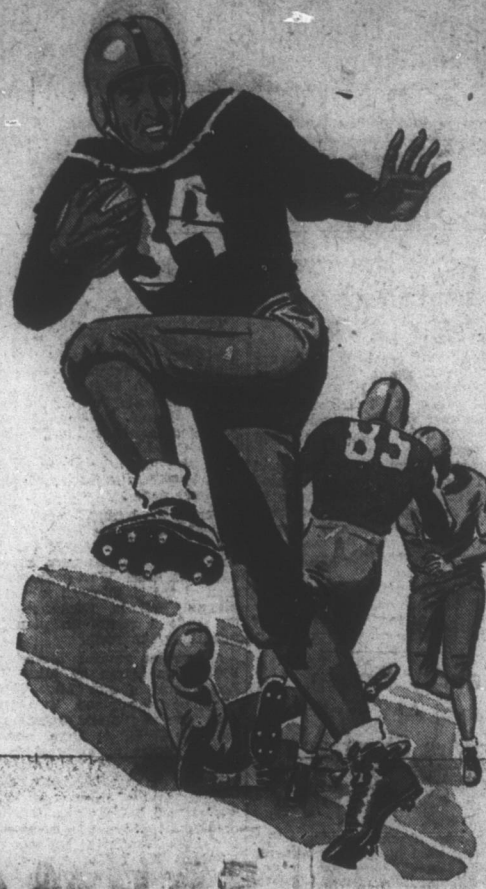

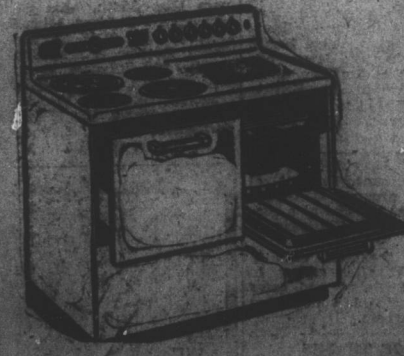
