With two state dinners, four receptions and a couple of wreath-placing ceremonies behind them, the 25-year-old princess and her husband spent their last hours in this capital like a couple of tourists completing an all-too-short vacation.

The couple operated on a pre-arranged split-second timetable to see the most in the least possible time and still get away about 1:30 p. m. on their return flight to Montreal.

They hoped to have a long look at New York when their plane passes over the nation's biggest city this afternoon.
