

Benson Negroes Held As Burglars

Two Benson Negroes, Henry Williams, 29, and Willie James Campbell, 19, are being held in Johnston County jail without privilege of bond on a charge of first-degree burglary.

They are accused of breaking and entering the home of Mrs. J. S. Benton, wife of the late State Senator and newspaper publisher in Benson, on the night of October 28, while she was asleep, and stealing \$50 in cash. Entrance was gained by cutting a side screen door, unlatching the screen and entering the house through a door that was locked.

The thieves are said to have gone into the bedroom and taken a pocket book from a dresser at the end of the bed. Mrs. Benton was awakened by them as they left the house, reported Police Chief Johnnie Medlin.

The pair have waived preliminary

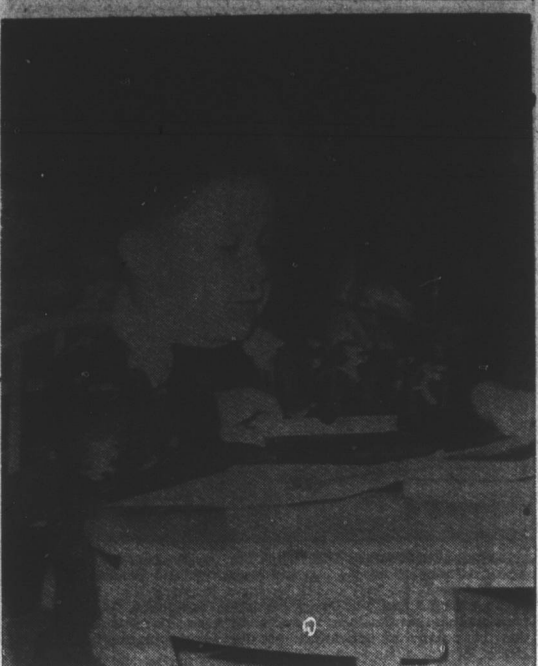
Mrs. Weathers Dies At Home In Fuquay
