Judge Acquits

as long as nobody sees him." In reply to the open accusation by Solicitor Hooks, Judge Crisp said that listening to fervent pleas of prosecutors had gotten him in trouble with the Supreme Court before and that he didn't intend to let that happen in this case.

JOHNSON MADE MOTION Defense Attorney W. A. Johnson made the motion for non-suit and acquittal on the argument that evidence pointed the finger of suspicion but only suspicion at the defendant, and actually had placed his brother, Tom Newton, closer to the scene of the crime.

The courtroom was crowded and the judge considered the motion for a few minutes and then announced his decision.

"This case is built on the treacherous sand of circumstantial evidence alone," declared the judge, "and under the law to allow this case to go to the jury on circumstantial evidence the Supreme Court has said it must exclude every reasonable hypothesis except guilt or it will not stand.

CLOSE CASE Judge Crisp said the case was as close as it could be to where the ruling would apply.

"I feel," he asserted, "that this man is guilty, but I seriously doubt if this case would stand up in the Supreme Court. Mr. Solicitor, you just don't have the evidence."

Judge Crisp pointed out that bystanders might not understand why the court would have to make this ruling and then quoted several cases in which the ruling applied.

"We have every bit of evidence," Solicitor Hooks told the judge, "except someone seeing the defendant light the fuse."

"This defendant was seen at the scene of the explosion an hour beforehand, made threats, couldn't be found after the explosion and dynamite which two people had seen at his house was not there after the explosion," continued Solicitor Hooks.

REFLECTION ON JUSTICE "I think it would be a reflection on our system of jurisprudence if a jury was prevented from passing on this case," he added.

The solicitor later directed hot words toward the judge after he announced his decision.

At this point a state witness, Junner Ellis, was recalled, and looking toward him the Solicitor said, "I see that this witness is drunk, your Honor, and I wish you would deal with him accordingly." Ellis drew a 30 days and a \$25 fine for contempt of court.
