OWNS 50 OTHERS Schmitt and his wife are fond of animals. Their 40-acre farm home is a haven for unwanted animals, and at present houses 50 other dogs, 75 cats, uncounted pigeons and four horses. But of all the dogs, Pal was Schmitt's favorite.

"Goodbye, old pal," he sobbed beside the dog's casket. One of the dozen or more women mourners comforted Schmitt.

"He understands, Fred," she said. "He understands." MADE THE COFFIN The flowers surrounding the handmade casket were inscribed simply "To My Pal." Schmitt made the casket himself.

The mourners trooped past the casket for a last look at the big dog. In his prime, Pal weighed near 200 pounds.

Several of the mourners stopped to pat Pal's head. "My, he looks so natural," one woman sobbed.

There wasn't any organ music for Pal's last farewell. Schmitt said he couldn't get anyone to loan him a portable organ. But Pal's 50 friends kept up a dirge of howling in the background, led by Pal's best companion, Fritz.

Paul did, however, receive a eulogy. Miss Virginia Braswell, another owner of a home for lost and unwanted animals, read "A Tribute to a Dog."

Then the Rev. J. B. Knifton, pastor of the Mount Calvary Church of God, spoke briefly of dogs' place in society.

"This is no pretense," he said. "This is not a religious ceremony. It is being done in respect to a couple we know and admire. Schmitt said when he dies, he wanted to be cremated and the ashes strewn over Pal's grave. "That dog was my whole life," he said.

Purdie asks that truck owners desiring plates, have this information readily available, in order to save time.

Plates may be purchased at the Purdie Equipment Co., starting Saturday, from 9:00 a. m. until 4:00 p. m. daily and from 9:00 a. m. until 12:00 noon on Saturdays. There is no extra charge, the service is performed by the company in cooperation with the Carolina Motor Club, as a courtesy to persons in the area who wish to purchase plates without mailing the form to the State Department of Motor Vehicles.

(Continued From Page One) to Wherry's Senate seat. Peterson, who will appoint a successor to serve until the election, is a candidate in the 1952 primary for the seat now held by Sen. Hugh Butler. Wherry's death may eliminate a bitter GOP battle over Butler's seat.

Peterson could resign as governor, be appointed to succeed Wherry by a Republican lieutenant governor, and then run next year for the balance of Wherry's term which expires in 1954.

Some observers expect Eisenhower partisans to seek election of Saltonstall to the floor leader job. Whether Taft supporters would resist this move would depend largely on Taft's attitude.

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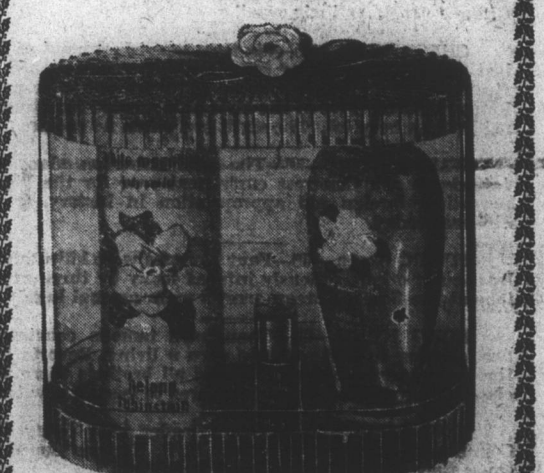
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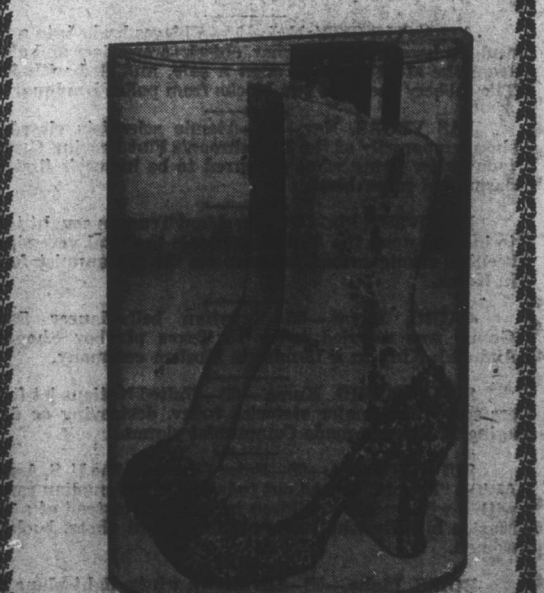
