

North Carolina Schools, Sports Participation Regulation Data

The revised regulations for participation in interschool athletics as adopted at the High Point conference of the Division of Superintendents of the North Carolina Education Association is published in The Daily Record for the interest of sports fans.

The regulations are to go into effect on July 1, 1952, under the supervision of the State Department of Public Instruction.

D. H. Conley, superintendent of Pitt County Schools, is president of the superintendent's division. A. B. Gibson, superintendent of Laurinburg schools and president of the NCEA, headed a three-man committee that drew up the regulations.

1. All schools must, if they participate in any interscholastic sports program, conform to the following eligibility requirements:

a. If a resident, previous term, a player must have been in attendance at his present school or unit, 80 per cent of the term and secured passing grades on a "minimum load" of scholastic courses.

b. If a non-resident of district (unit) a player must have attended his present school or unit 75 per cent of the two most recent terms and secured passing grades on a "minimum load" of scholastic courses at the end of the each term.

c. A player must have been in attendance for at least 60 per cent of the previous term at an approved high school, or in case of a first year student, in an approved elementary school.

d. A player must secure passing grades on at least three courses each term. At least one of these courses must be an academic subject.

e. A student, upon entering grade 9, is eligible for competition on high school athletic teams only during the succeeding eight consecutive semesters or terms for 90 days each.

f. No student may participate in high school athletic contests who is 19 years of age before July 1 of the fiscal school year.

g. No student may participate in school contests after graduation or after being eligible for graduation from high school.

h. No student who has enrolled in a college, or who has signed a contract for professional play, will be eligible for high school competition.

i. Any student who has participated in an all-star game is ineligible for further participation in that particular sport.

2. State school laws require that all gate receipts from athletic contests be handled by a bonded school treasurer.

3. No more than one regularly scheduled football, two baseball, two basketball games, two tennis and two golf matches per week may be played except for regularly scheduled games postponed for emergency reasons. It is strongly recommended that girls' basketball games be limited to one a week.

4. Limit the season's games to 10 including practice games or scrimmage with other schools in football, twenty basketball games after December 1 and twenty baseball. No spring football.

5. Soccer, track, wrestling, swimming and other interscholastic sports shall be limited to one meet, game or match per week. No boxing.

6. No games shall be played before school opens or after school closes unless school opening is unavoidably delayed.

7. No post season games except county, conference, or state play offs. No regional or state championship games for girls.

8. Trips that involve overnight travel and out of state games are strongly discouraged unless geographic conditions require such travel in order to facilitate participation between schools of comparable size.

9. No tournaments or games sponsored by organizations or individuals other than bona fide public schools may be entered.

10. No more than two tournaments a year may be entered in any one sport. Girls are limited to participation in one tournament.

11. Coaches must be certificated teachers who are bona fide members of the school faculty, or practice teachers.

12. It is recommended that girls teams be coached by women teachers and required that a woman teacher accompany the team on all trips and be present when games are played.

13. All players must receive a medical examination within the 30 days period prior to the beginning of practice in any sport.

14. Players must receive a medical examination prior to his or her return to play or practice following a serious injury or illness.

15. It is recommended that players be covered by adequate medical and accident insurance and that medical aid be immediately available at all games involving body contact.

16. Practice in any sport may not start before August 15 or two weeks prior to the regular term opening of schools.

17. Tournament play shall be limited to three days in any week and there shall be one day at least between successive contests played by a team.

18. Interscholastic championship

competition for boys and girls in grades one through eight is strongly opposed and it is recommended that this practice be discontinued. It is also recommended that intercity, intercommunity and interschool championship games between teams composed of elementary school age children sponsored by community organizations be discouraged in every way possible.

19. Violations of any of the above regulations would forfeit the rights of the school to participate in interscholastic athletics for a given period of time to be determined by the Executive Committee.

20. Section One

There shall be an Executive Committee of 11 members composed of four superintendents; three principals; two coaches and two representatives from the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction.

Section Two

That the president of the Division of Superintendents shall appoint four members of said Division; that the president of the Division of Principals of the NCEA shall appoint two members of said Division; that the president of the North Carolina Teachers Association shall appoint one (1) member of said Division; that the president of the N. C. Coaches Association shall appoint one member of the said division; that the Coaches Association of the North Carolina Teachers Association shall appoint one member of said division.

Section Three

The term of office of the members of the Executive Committee shall be as follows:

a. Appointments by the president of the Division of Superintendents

2 for 1 year

1 for 2 years

1 for 3 years

b. Appointment from the Division of Principals NCEA

1 for 2 years

1 for 3 years

c. Appointments from N. C. Coaches Association (white)

1 for 1 year

d. Appointments for Coaches Association (negro)

1 for 3 years

e. Appointments from N. C. Department of Public Instruction

1 for 1 year

1 for 2 years

Section Four

The initial appointment shall be made on or before May 1, 1952, for terms beginning July 1, 1952. All appointments for expired terms shall be for a period of ten years. A vacancy accruing before expiration of term shall be filled in the same manner as for regular terms.

MORE ON FEATHERS

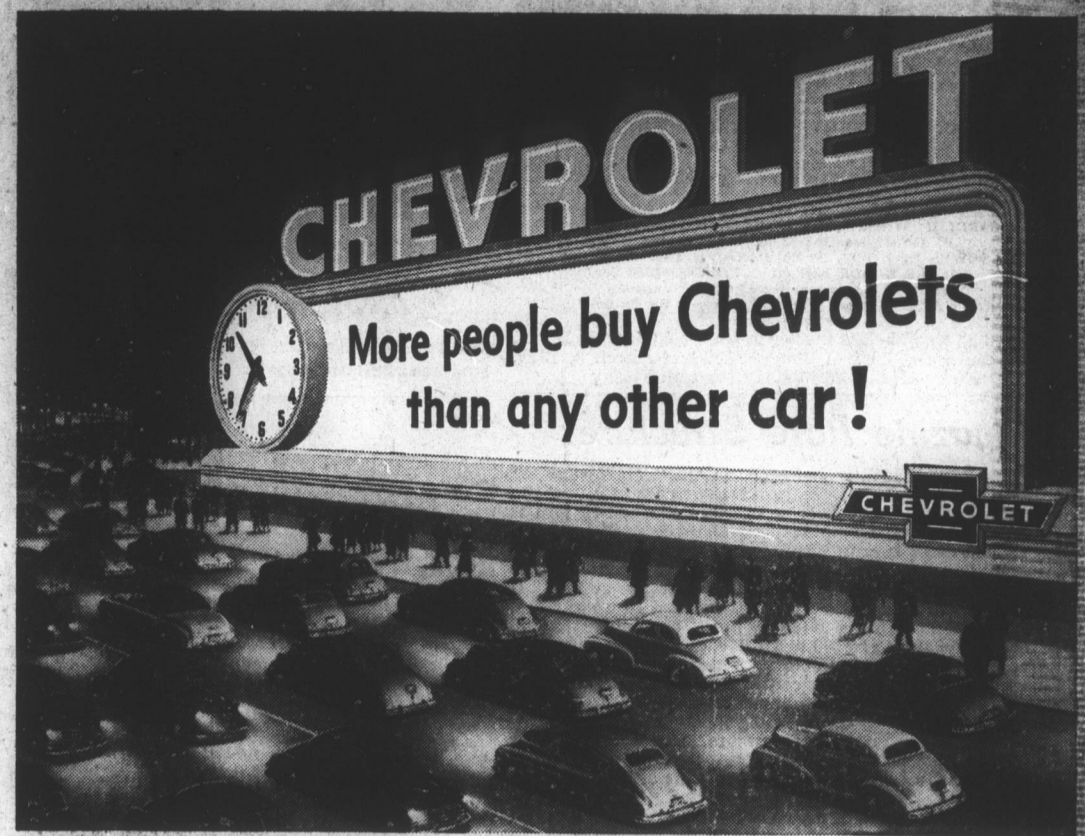
In his column in the Raleigh Times, Ben Templeton wrote that Feathers chose to be discharged rather than see two assistants fired.
