Dunn Construction (Continued from page 1) The building in 1951 cost \$14,000 making the entire building investment \$34,000. The most expensive single structure, business or otherwise for which a permit was issued during 1951 was the Godwin Building and Supply Company's new warehouse at \$10,000. Building permits issued during the past year called for a total of \$366,925. Dwellings again took the lead with a total of \$248,300. Repairs on dwellings amounted to \$22,475 in 1951. New business structures accounted for only \$43,700 during 1951, but repairs and additions were higher than in 1950 with a total of \$47,780 noted. One church expended \$2,000 on alterations and repairs. The picture reflects the continued growth of the community and the efforts by builders to bridge the gap between existing housing and the increasing growth of Dunn.

Churchill (Continued From Page One) officials here emphasized their expectation that the Big Two talks will be "friendly and constructive." President Truman himself obviously shared this view. He was asked at his press conference yesterday about a report published in the London Times that some American officials have indicated Churchill will be an unwelcome visitor. Among other things, the influential British newspaper said, "inspired stories" have been circulated that Mr. Truman "saw no reason" for Churchill's visit and "was rather annoyed at the prospect of it." Mr. Truman replied vigorously that it was foolish for anyone to doubt Churchill's welcome here.
