lemen have got to worry about the Japanese Peace Treaty, aid to Europe, the business of an Ambassador to the Vatican and so telling what all else. The Senator from Texas is against that Ambassador idea; he thinks his committee is too.

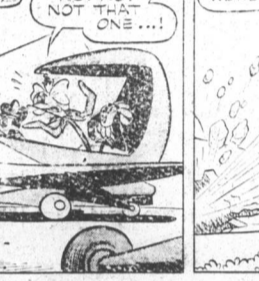
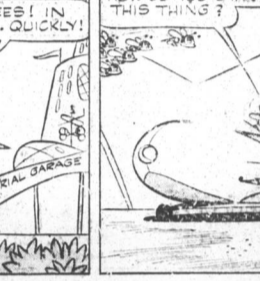
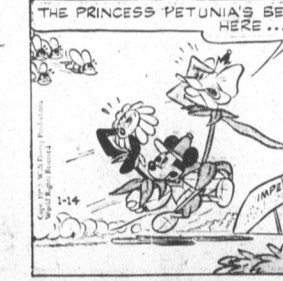
