FIRST WITNESS
The young widow was the first witness in the murder trial of Negro paroled Lafayette Miller, charged with Boyd's slaying and the kidnapping of Mrs. Boyd. The jury to try Miller was completed at mid-morning with 10 whites and three Negroes seated. The alternate juror is white. Miller, still under heavy guard, sat with his head bent, holding his face in his hands. The defense has indicated it will call Miller, 21, to the stand, possibly tomorrow. Mrs. Boyd said after her husband was shot she turned on the light. As she did so she said she heard a voice outside the window of their small frame farmhouse near Chocowinity. "I asked what he wanted. The voice said 'the car keys and all the money you have.'" "I got the keys from Harvie's pocket and went outside. I asked him to take me to Chocowinity and he got on the car. He said 'where are you going to sit?' and I said 'on the front seat with you, or will I drive?' He said that would be too suspicious. Wearing a black coat and a small gray and black hat, Mrs. Boyd looked steadily at special prosecutor Malcolm Paul as he gently questioned her. She told of driving Miller out of the yard and a short distance down the highway.
PUT HER IN TRUNK
"I ordered me to step the car. He asked if the trunk was locked and I said yes. He ordered me to unlock it and get in. He said, 'No screaming or funny stuff. I mean business.'" "I got in and he locked it. We rode for what I guess was about an hour. I heard a siren screaming. I could tell there was more than one voice questioning him. I heard someone ask for his driver's license and someone else ask about the gun. Then I relaxed. I shouted 'Help, Help, don't let him get me.'"

Democratic Senators Say Truman Will Run

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Some highly-placed Democrats, who formerly had their doubts about it, were convinced today that President Truman intends to run for reelection. They did not claim to have "the word" direct from the White House. But they thought they could see enough straws in the wind to know which way it is blowing. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey D-Minn said after a White House visit earlier this week that he doesn't believe Mr. Truman has made up his mind what he will do. But most other Democrats are taking the President's word for it could throw his delegates on the spot that he knows what he is going to do, but isn't ready to say yet. One prominent party strategist predicted that Mr. Truman's decision to seek another term will become manifest in a few weeks in his attitude toward the various state presidential primaries. TO CORRAL DELEGATES Another, who was guessing only a few days ago that Mr. Truman would not run, said he now expects pro-Truman forces to work in the spring primaries for states of convention delegates pledged to the President, or at least pledged to friendly "favorite son" candidates. The latter pattern already has emerged in Minnesota, where Humphrey has been asked to run as a "stand in" candidate who can't throw his delegates on the second convention ballot either to Mr. Truman or to his designated "heir."
