wishing windows.

"She told me, I can't satisfy my husband. Everything I do is wrong. I want you to kill him for me," Miller said from the stand.

"I told her I ain't never done anything like that. I told her I was already in trouble. She asked me did I have a gun. I told her no. She told me not to say anything about it."

Miller said he was cleaning floors at the home of his parole officer, Miss Elizabeth Warren, sometime later, and saw a gun.

"I said to myself, 'I'll get it.' I picked up the gun, went outside and hid it in the hedge. I came back two nights later, and picked it up. Then I goes to the house where I'm staying and hides it behind the shed. It stayed there about a week."

The dinky Negro said Mr. and Mrs. Boyd asked him to do some odd jobs at their farmhouse on the following Saturday, and as he was working, Mrs. Boyd asked him again about killing her husband.

"I said I didn't know, but I told her I'd bring a gun over here. He said he quit work about 5:30 p. m. on Wednesday, the day before Thanksgiving.

I took the gun, wrapped in bur-lap bags, and rode my bicycle into Chowinwilly. I left the bike on the edge of the woods and came

City May Buy Asphalt Mixer

Dunn's city council Monday night will consider the purchase of an asphalt mixing machine, a new city sanitation ordinance and a variety of other matters.

The agenda was released this morning by City Manager Oliver O. Manning.

Street Superintendent J. Allan Bass has recommended the purchase of a small portable asphalt mixing machine which, it is believed, would be a wise investment and quickly pay for itself.

At present, the city is buying asphalt in five-ton dumps from a Fayetteville concern and has to pay the cost of hauling.

The big objection to the present system is that the asphalt transported this distance gets cold and hard before it can be used. Only a small amount is used at a time for street repaving.

The machine would cost approximately \$2,000.

OTHER MATTERS
Willie Warren, operator of the Carolina Oil Stores located at the corner of Cumberland and Lucknow Square, has asked permission to erect a sign between the sidewalk and street.

The board will consider the proposed sanitation ordinance and will also consider substitution of a gravity sewer line in the new Latimer development instead of a lift.

Mr. Manning said today that the vacancy for a second Negro policeman has not yet been filled and that it may be a couple of weeks before action is taken. He said he had several applicants for the job but planned to go slow. John Brookington has been employed as one of the two Negro officers to be added to the force.
